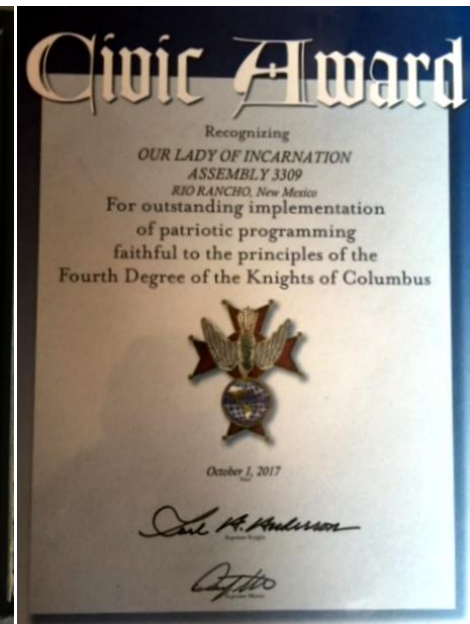
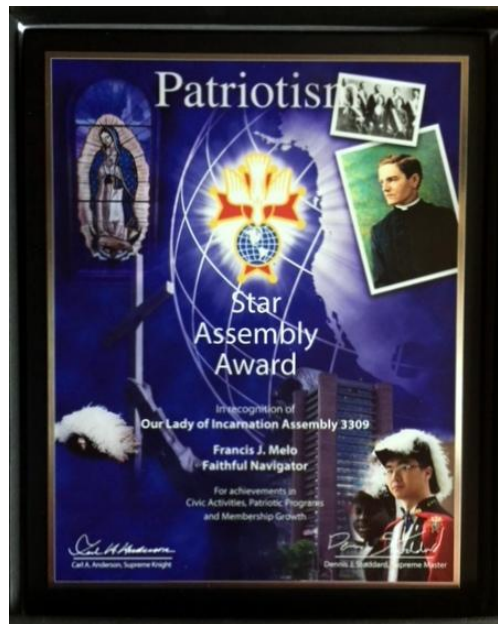

Saint Nicholas

It is believed that Nicholas was born in Patura, Lycia, Asia Minor, although the exact date is unknown. He was bishop of Myra, known for his great zeal and holiness. He was once imprisoned for his faith under the Emperor Diocletian, and it is said that he was present at the Council of Nicaea where he denounced Arianism.

The rest of what is known about St. Nicholas is mostly speculative. There is a story about three poverty-stricken young girls whose father was planning to give them up to prostitution since he could not afford dowries for them. Nicholas, hearing about this, and having been born into wealth, took three bags of gold and threw them into the girls' house. Afterwards, all three girls were married and saved from lives of prostitution.

It is said that Nicholas destroyed pagan temples and devoted himself to converting sinners and helping the poor. He is the patron of storm-beset sailors because it is said that he miraculously saved some doomed mariners off the coast of Lycia. He is also patron of prisoners and children as well as the patron saint of Greece, Sicily, and Russia.

He was referred to as Klaus (short for Nicholas) by some, later to be known as Sint Klaus, and by the Dutch as Santa Claus. Saint Nicholas died in 350 A.D.

Santa Claus?

About the only thing that Saint Nicholas has in common with the secular Santa Claus is generosity. Whereas Jolly ole' St. Nick brings material gifts to children once a year, the real Saint Nicholas gave of himself daily. His gifts brought food to the hungry, clothes to the poor and nourishment to the soul. He gave of himself to others. He was not only good and generous, but also pious and devout, and he centered his life on God.

The popular figure of Santa Claus, so prevalent at Christmas, is based less on the Christian saint than on the Germanic god, Thor. This god was associated with winter and the Yule log and rode in a chariot drawn by goats named Cracker and Gnasher.

From Master of The Fourth Degree, Rich Favela

Happy New Year worthy Sir Knights of New Mexico! The announcement of the new Fourth Degree uniform by Supreme last August generated a lot of buzz the last five months of 2017 and it's sure to spill over into 2018 as we strive to implement the changeover. As most of you have heard by now, just before Thanksgiving, Supreme announced a significant change to the timeline regarding the implementation of the new Fourth Degree uniform - the phase-out date for the cape and chapeau of the old **Full Regalia** ensemble was extended an additional year until **June 30, 2019.**

The Supreme Knight gave the following guidance at the unveiling of the new uniform, to wit: **"We understand that some Fourth Degree members are fond of the old regalia. The cape and chapeau regalia will still be allowed, for a time, in those assemblies and districts that wish to use it, though the preference is for the new uniform."** Accordingly, here in the District of New Mexico, color corps members participating in call-outs ***as members of honor guards or color guards*** for Rosaries, wakes, funeral Masses, rallies, processions, Patriotic exemplifications, March for Life events, state meetings, Mass entrance processions, etc., will continue to turn out in the **old Full Regalia**. This does not preclude SKs who possess new Fourth Degree uniforms from attending or observing these events; they are encouraged to do so but without wearing their swords, white gloves and service baldrics. In the months ahead, when the occasion presents itself where **all** SKs participating in a color corps call-out event (to include the CCC and DM) are in possession of the new Fourth Degree uniform, then that uniform shall be the attire for the event. In other words, we will not be mixing old Full Regalia with the new Fourth Degree uniform at color corps call-out events here in the District of New Mexico. Regional District Marshals will coordinate with assembly FNs and CCCs to implement this policy. Note: For the NM KofC State Convention in Albuquerque the weekend of 4 – 6 May 2018, let's plan on having two full color guards to participate in the posting/retrieving of colors for the convention and banquets – one attired in traditional Full Regalia and the other in the new Fourth Degree uniform. This will give conference attendees several chances to view and contrast the old and the new attire of Patriotic Degree Sir Knights. More details to follow

Uniform Notes

– Sir Knights attired in dark suits may wear the **social** baldric, if desired. If worn, the social baldric is worn across the tie and not underneath it. It's not authorized for wear with the new Fourth Degree Uniform and it will remain as part of the tuxedo Regalia after June 30, 2019.

- Miniature past and former jewels of office worn on the tuxedo jacket of Regalia/Full Regalia will **not** be worn by SKs when attired in a dark suit. They may be worn on the New Fourth Degree uniform blazer. SKs may wear the ribbon-suspended jewel of office (Third or Fourth Degree) around his neck with the dark suit and the new Fourth Degree uniform but only if he is currently serving in that office.

– White Shirts. A plain white, long-sleeve dress shirt (plain collar – no button down, no French cuffs) is required when wearing the new Fourth Degree uniform. If you are a Sir Knight or Patriotic Degree candidate and wear a dark suit, you must wear a white, long-sleeve dress shirt; however, the shirt can have a button-down collar and/or French cuffs. You can wear either a long tie **or** bow tie with the dark suit.

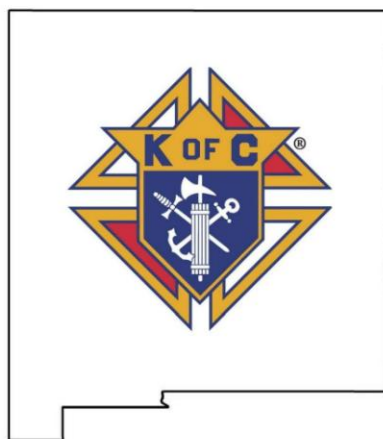
– When wearing the New Fourth Degree Uniform two-button blue blazer, the bottom button is left unbuttoned. When tailoring the gray trousers worn with the blazer, do not have them cuffed.

Upcoming Fourth Degree Calendar Events

- The annual Sanctity of Life and Unity Day (SOLAUD) Mass and March will take place in Santa Fe on Wednesday, January 17th. Mass will be concelebrated by the bishops of New Mexico starting at 12:00 noon and the march from the Cathedral Basilica of St. Francis to the Roundhouse will take place around 2:00 p.m. SKs in the traditional Full Regalia participating in the honor guard for the Mass should assemble NLT 1130 a.m. at the side of the cathedral. Unless there has been a last-minute change, swords are not permitted in the cathedral so leave them at home or in your cars. Be aware that the traditional continental breakfast served at the hall next to the Cathedral by council #1 51 38 before the Mass may not take place this year.

- The next NM Patriotic Exemplification is now scheduled for **Saturday, February 17, 2018** in Los Alamos NM and is being hosted by Donald A. Larson Assembly #688. Ceremony and banquet will occur at the Columbian Club Hall and Mass will be celebrated at Immaculate Heart of Mary Church. Because the Saturday Vigil Mass starts at 6:00 p.m., exemplification events will start at 12:00 noon instead of 11:00 a.m. Detailed instruction letter will be finalized by January 7th and sent to all FNs and FCs and will also be posted on the state council website. In the interim, please focus on recruiting potential candidates from your home councils and vetting their Forms 4 at this month's assembly meeting.

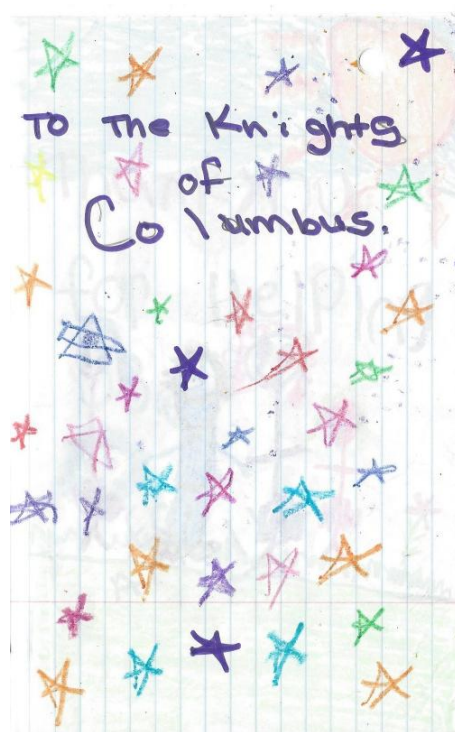

Today's Knights

"EVERYBODY WELCOME, EVERYTHING FREE": 1911-1918

As membership in the Knights of Columbus grew, the Order became increasingly known as a force for public good. Following the dedication ceremony for the Christopher Columbus Memorial Fountain in Washington, D.C., in 1912, a reporter for *The Washington Star* noted that the large number of Knights in attendance “marked anew the important position of the Knights of Columbus as an order in the social fabric of the United States.”

In response to growing anti-Catholic hostility and the rise of socialism, two Knights, David Goldstein and Peter W. Collins, embarked on an extensive, 27,000-mile lecture tour throughout North America in 1914. Later that same year, the Order established the K of C Commission on Religious Prejudice. The commission’s work concluded in 1917, when the United States entered World War I.

During the Great War, the Order provided rest and recreational facilities and social services to Allied servicemen of all faiths. K of C Huts throughout the United States and Europe provided religious services, supplies and recreation under the motto, “Everybody Welcome, Everything Free.”

Everybody meant everybody. Whatever your race or creed, you were welcome at K of C facilities. In fact, the Order was praised by a contemporary African American historian of World War I, because “unlike the other social welfare organizations operating in the war, it never drew the color line.”

As a result of the Order’s wartime work, which earned high praise from Pope Benedict XV, nearly 400,000 men joined the Knights between 1917 and 1923.

1910: Notre Dame Council 1477 is chartered in the spring of 1910, becoming the first of nearly 250 college councils worldwide.

1912: With support from the Knights, the Christopher Columbus Memorial Fountain is dedicated in Washington, D.C. Some 20,000 Knights attend the ceremonies, which are overseen by President William H. Taft.

1914: Tens of thousands of copies of a “bogus oath” are circulated to defame the Knights of Columbus. The Knights, in turn, lay the groundwork for a lecture series and educational programs to combat anti-Catholic hostility. Between 1914 and 1917, the number of anti-Catholic publications drops from 60 to fewer than five.

1916: When National Guardsmen are sent to the U.S.-Mexico border to prevent Mexican Gen. Francisco “Pancho” Villa from raiding towns in New Mexico, Arizona and Texas, K of C councils in those states spontaneously respond to the religious and social needs of troops serving there.

1917: When the United States enters World War I, Supreme Knight Flaherty writes President Woodrow Wilson telling him that the Order plans to establish centers to provide for the troops’ “recreational and spiritual comfort.” The Knights’ services, he says, will be offered “regardless of creed.”

1917: By the summer of 1917, the Order opens service centers, or “K of C Huts,” in training camps and behind the lines of battle. The Knights and independent fund drives raise nearly \$30 million to finance the huts.

Join the sidewalk counselors as a prayer partner and help save lives. The counselors are at Planned Parenthood on Tuesday and Friday from 8-11 AM and at the late term abortion mill on Wednesday and Thursday from 7-11 AM.

DISABILITY INCOME INSURANCE

What is it?

Disability income insurance helps replace lost income when you are unable to work due to a disability resulting from an illness or accident.

Who needs it?

Disability income insurance helps protect your most important financial asset – your paycheck – so it should be an important part of every family's planning. Long-term disability is much more common than other unfortunate circumstances that are commonly covered by insurance. Consider the fact that you face a 1 in 100 risk of losing your home to a fire ^[1], but a 1 in 4 risk of suffering a long-term disability ^[2].

Despite the odds and the prevalence of long-term disability – nearly 11 million Americans are receiving federal disability benefits^[3] – more than 100 million Americans are without private disability income insurance.^[4] In addition, any disability income insurance you may have through your employer may very well be insufficient or contingent on certain circumstances (like worker's compensation).

How does it work?

As an added bonus, our disability income insurance policies come with a waiver of premium provision, which waives your policy's premiums while you're suffering from a disability.

What options do I have?

Benefit Period

The maximum benefit period is the longest period for which monthly disability benefits are payable for any one period of a disability. The benefit resets once the disability concludes. You may choose from:

2-Year – Protect your paycheck with two years of disability income payments.

5-Year – Protect your paycheck with five years of disability income payments.

To Age 67 – Protect all your working years with disability income payments until you reach retirement age.

Monthly Benefit

Working with your Knights of Columbus field agent, you establish the monthly benefit amount that the policy provides, based on your income and subject to certain limits.

Elimination Period

Disability income insurance policies come with an elimination period, which serves as your deductible or out-of-pocket amount. You can select a 30, 90, or 180-day elimination period, after which time your benefits will begin to be paid.
